



Erasmus +

- Colegio Cruz del Campo is co-funded by the Erasmus + program of the European Union
 - Connected to specific primary schools across the European Union
 - Teachers and students have visited other countries such as:
 - Sweden
 - Poland
 - Ireland
 - Italy
 - France
 - Teachers and students from the other schools also come to Spain
 - The goal is for the students to experience new cultures they aren't used to in daily life as well as communicating with the other students as well (usually using English or few words from the country they are visiting)



What to expect in class

- Give yourself about a week to prepare class material
 - I usually ask the teachers if they need something prepared ahead of time (even if it is a small worksheet, wordsearch, crossword, etc)
- If you know Spanish, don't let the students know this
 - They'll want to speak to you in Spanish rather than English
- Talk to your students and get to know them!
 - Creating bonds is key in getting to know the dynamics of each class and what their specific needs may be

- Things you could be asked to prepare:
 - Powerpoint presentations
 - Worksheets (word search, crossword, fill-in-the-blank, etc.)







Going to vs Gonna

- Both ways (going to and gonna) are correct, but **one** is more **informal** than the other
- You can use “gonna” in everyday conversation with friends or family
 - I **do not** recommend using “gonna” with a person of higher authority

Examples:

Be going to + verb → DEFINITE future plan

Talking to my boss

“ I am **going to go** to the movie theater tonight with a few of my co-workers”

Texting a friend

I'm **gonna go** to the movie theater tonight with a few of my co-workers”

Both are saying the same thing but gonna is informal and going to is formal (neutral)




