



Fig. 1. Louis Washkansky, the first human-to-human heart transplant patient on 3 December 1967, seen here a few days after the operation. (Photo from the Heart of Cape Town Museum.)

New Laws in the United States of America

Civil Rights Act of 1964 - It forbade discrimination on the basis of sex, as well as, race in hiring, promoting, and firing.

Voting Rights Act of 1965 - It outlawed discriminatory voting practices in many southern states after the Civil War, including literacy tests as a prerequisite to voting.


Immigration and Nationality Services Act of 1965 - Created a system that focused on immigrants' skills and family relations with citizens or U.S. residents.

Fair Housing Act of 1968 - Prohibited discrimination concerning the sale, rental, and financing of housing based on race, religion, national origin, sex, handicap and family status.

Hispanic-American Culture

Rebound in Hispanic-American culture in music, foods, culture, and identity. Became popular and it was assimilated into American mainstream. Bilingual programs where Spanish was taught.







Spanish language television networks, radio stations, and newspapers increased in Mexico border towns, and East coast cities like NYC and growth of Cuban American communities in Miami, Florida.

Second-Wave Feminism

Focused on changing cultural and social norms. At the time, women were seen as homemakers, who were excluded from many jobs & professions. This new wave was a critique on a male-dominated society and questioned patriarchal institutions and cultural practices throughout society. Second-wave feminism brought attention to

issues of:

- Domestic violence
- Marital Rape

It also created rape crisis centers and women's shelters, and brought changes in custody law and divorce law.
